Catholic Charities Responds to the Opioid Crisis

FOR MANY IN OUR DIOCESE, the opioid crisis isn't another headline in the news. It is impacting their lives, too. Fairfax County ranks highest in the state for the number of drug overdose deaths. At parishes throughout the diocese, funerals are being held for its victims.

At the urging of Bishop Michael Burbidge, Catholic Charities took the lead on a diocesan response to this crisis. We began with a summer 2018 workshop for members of our Parish Liaison Network. In early fall at Good Shepherd Catholic Church, we co-hosted with Bishop Burbidge an all-day diocesanwide conference that featured addiction experts and our director of clinical services, psychologist Michael Horne. We are building partnerships with federal and state public health professionals to gather resources, including education, epidemiology, and addiction treatment best practices. Our effort will include a parish component to provide a spiritual and supportive response to individuals and families struggling with opioids addiction, as well as spreading awareness and resources to respond to the crisis.

Following discussion with pastors, Catholic Charities will conduct a landscape assessment of support services that are available throughout the diocese as well as identify gaps that need to be filled. This information will be distributed widely allowing pastors, families, schools, parishes, and

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communities to be better equipped to help those affected by addiction in their regions and will include:

- Outpatient counselors who can address this issue including Catholic Charities clinicians providing services at 16 parishes;
- Inpatient units or hospitals in our region that address opioid issues;
- Reputable pain management groups;
- Narcotics Anonymous and other addict support groups (like The Calix Society), including meeting locations and times;
- Peer support groups for families and loved ones;
- School programs;
- Community Resources; and
- Other recommended services. †

Catholic Charities Attorneys Help Those Facing Grave Harm

Two CATHOLIC CHARITIES ATTORNEYS spent a week at the U.S. border between Nogales, Mexico and Nogales, Arizona, to provide legal assistance to those who qualified.

Ashley LaRiccia and Tyler Lloyd, who work in Charities' Hogar Immigrant Legal Services office in Alexandria, spent five days conducting immigration screenings and asylum orientations for individuals and families. LaRiccia and Lloyd worked alongside the Kino Border Initiative, a Catholic organization that provides humanitarian assistance to migrants.

Their October trip was organized in partnership with the Catholic Legal Immigration Network (CLINIC) following an appeal for attorneys to provide legal advice for those who qualify. CLINIC reimbursed partner agencies for the expenses. **"While many of the stories did move me to near tears,** I returned energized and ready to advocate not only for my individual clients but for more humane policies at our borders," LaRiccia said.

She interviewed migrants to determine if they met the legal standards required to apply for asylum in the United States. Simply "fearing violence" in their home country is not sufficient, their lives must be threatened. Consider the case of a Central American grandmother whom LaRicca assisted instead.

Her pregnant daughter had been murdered by a cartel and her granddaughter also had been shot. Despite the cartel having control of the region, she risked her own life and reported her daughter's brutal murder to police. They were unwilling or unable to assist and as a result, the grandmother

had nowhere in her home country to find shelter. With this additional information, LaRiccia now could help the grandmother understand her claim in the context of asylum law and apply legally.

In Nogales the pair also witnessed the Catholic Church in action. The Missionary Sisters of the Eucharist and volunteers provide meals, distribute clothing, and offer medical assistance to the migrants. They also run a shelter for women and children waiting to cross the border.

"If it were not for the Catholic Church and the Kino Border Institute these migrants would be left completely on their own," LaRiccia said. "(The sisters) live day in day out feeding these people and it seems like with each group they come in to meet, they treat them with the same exact level of kindness." †

CHRIST HOUSE MEN'S TRANSFORMATIONAL HOUSING

Men Overcome Homelessness at Christ House



Christ House offers transitional housing to homeless men. Its recently renovated facilities afford a safe, clean, and welcoming environment to single men reclaiming their self-sufficiency and independence.

Note that the poor of the poor

- 1. Transformational housing for men;
- 2. Emergency financial assistance for those facing eviction or loss of utilities;
- 3. Evening meals provided by parishes and other volunteers 365 days a year for the homeless and hungry including families;
- 4. A food pantry through the St. Lucy Project; and
- 5. Gently used clothing at the adjacent thrift store.

Christ House is the **only transformational shelter for men** in the City of Alexandria. Unlike "rapid rehousing" programs, our model provides longterm housing; case management; mental health counseling; and religious, psychological, and spiritual support for the men living there. *The goal of the program is self-sufficiency through stable employment and permanent housing.*

With your support, Christ House recently pursued a new strategic

direction that includes more intensive case management, clinical service, and workforce development. Adding a second case manager and a Catholic psychologist enables Christ House to provide longer-term care and a greater intensity of services that lead to improved outcomes.

The workforce development component helps clients increase their earning capacity and maintain their independence. This is essential to reduce their risk of

Of the **19 clients** who exited the program in the last year:



12 secured affordable housing.

returning to homelessness. Supporting a client while they are in a vocational or other educational program grants them the time needed to complete a degree or certificate program. Doing so increases their odds of securing a job (or jobs) that pay \$15/ hour, which is what the City of Alexandria considers the **minimum livable wage** for the region.

Program Director John Croft shared that the "entire program runs more effectively" with these changes. It allows for more intensive, more frequent, and more meaningful change for the clients and incorporates additional life-skills coaching. The case managers can provide direct, hands-on guidance and real-time support for the men who live there.

In a phrase – it works.

Helping Birthmothers with Support and Information

WHEN MARIA REALIZED SHE WAS PREGNANT, she felt alone, scared, and worried. (Client name changed.)

Tragically, her pregnancy was the result of a brutal physical attack and rape. She was terrified at the prospect of raising a child conceived this way, and she was already struggling to provide for her other three children.

Maria had considered adoption already, however, she was misinformed by a nurse who told her that if she did place her baby with another family that she would also lose custody of her older children. **Fearing this outcome, she thought she had no choice but to abort the child.**

Thankfully, at the recommendation of a close friend, she contacted Catholic Charities to learn how to make an adoption plan. Within 24 hours, a caring and professional pregnancy and adoption counselor met with her at a coffee shop near her home. They explained the process to Maria and reassured her that choosing adoption would not result in losing custody of her children.

Maria's experience demonstrates the most significant barriers women face when considering adoption – *information about adoption is not presented*,



and when it is, it is often inaccurate or biased. Catholic Charities' Pregnancy and Adoption Support program exists to ensure women are more comfortable discussing adoption and that they receive accurate information.

Maria has given her child hope. She has chosen life.

Maria's feelings are normal. Uncertainty in birthmothers is common, whatever the circumstance. Our counselors encourage all our clients to explore their feelings and help them evaluate the options to make an informed decision for what they feel is the best life for herself and her child. Should it be required, Catholic Charities will provide pre-natal assistance or make referrals for services to stabilize her life and promote healing.

Our program remains a lifelong resource for all our adoptive families, adoptees, and birth parents. Adoption is a lifelong journey. Let us walk with you. **†**

Helping the Unemployed Find Good Jobs

ANY OF THE PEOPLE WHO COME to Catholic Charities seeking help are unemployed or underemployed. Most often, it is because they lack the skills required to be competitive in the marketplace. According to the American Association of Community Colleges, there are 500,000 unfilled jobs in the U.S. and only 43 percent of Americans possess the "middle skills" required to fill them. Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Arlington's Hogar Education Services is working to close that gap.

To address this issue, Catholic Charities has three new courses to help our students secure job readiness certifications.

These are:

- 1. GED Mathematical Reasoning;
- 2. Internet Core Competence Certification (IC3) preparation; and
- 3. National Retail Federation's Retail Industry Fundamentals preparation.

These three courses significantly expand the impact on those looking for work. As a result, the **number of students enrolled quadrupled** in a single semester and **the total credentials they earned tripled** in less than nine months.

Throughout the Spring 2018 semester (the most recent term student outcomes are available), there was a 94% student retention rate in the classes, 50% of students increased at least one English level (far surpassing the state's goal of 43%), and many of the workforce development students earned an industry-recognized credential or passed a GED subject-area exam.

In just ninety (90) days after course completion, many of the unemployed

students gained jobs, and some of the underemployed students were working full time. Of the students who remained unemployed, nearly half re-enrolled in courses for the Fall 2018 semester.

The student success stories show the strong impact these classes are having. As a direct result of her studies with Catholic Charities, particularly the computer skills she gained from the Computer 1 class, **Milagros** had a resume, marketable computer skills and secured a job, her first in 10 years. In addition, these new skills allowed Milagros to help her children in school because she could now better communicate with their teachers.

Naileth, who used the knowledge and skills she gained from the customer service course, started her own business in baking, which was her area of expertise in her home country. Finally, we are extremely proud of Henry, Helder, Fausto, and Maria, who passed their GED math exams on their first attempt over the summer, and are one step closer to providing better lives for their families. Because of these classes, these individuals (and many others) are now serious contenders in a competitive job market, and can bring skills to the interview and organizations to ensure employment and a better life for them and their family. **†**

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT

Meet John McKusker



JOHN MCKUSKER is a dedicated Catholic Charities volunteer for more than three years who is currently teaching GED Math at Hogar Education Services.

Tell me about your background. How does it transfer to your volunteer role?

I served in the U.S. Navy for ten years aboard submarines in the Pacific and then I ended up working for over 30 years as a government contractor. This included the design of computer systems projects and the management of their installation for the U.S. Navy, the Pentagon, Washington, DC Court system, and the U.S. Departments of Treasury and Housing and Urban Development.

In addition to technical services, I provided training to system users. My

When did you get involved with Catholic Charities and why?

When I retired, I knew that I wanted to do four things

- 1. Learn a foreign language;
- 2. Learn to play guitar;
- 3. Travel; and
- 4. Volunteer.

By trying to learn a new language, I can understand the perspective of students in my classes. It is difficult, and can be challenging, but it also rewarding to make progress. I get great joy from volunteering at Hogar teaching English and GED Math.

What do you do in your role(s)? What interested you in this specific program?

In August of 2015, I started teaching English at Catholic Charities' Hogar in Manassas. I was teaching at all levels. Then there was a need for someone to teach GED math, so I volunteered and have been doing that for the past two semesters as well. Math can be troublesome, especially with a language barrier. I try to bring real-life applications to the students when teaching. I am very interested in bringing American culture to the students, and equally so in learning their very different cultures from their countries. I believe they have a lot to offer to their new communities and I want to capture that experience.

What do you find most rewarding?

I have made a lot of new friends at Hogar, both staff and students. I really enjoy when I see a former student that has moved on to the next class level and is succeeding. Somehow, I have been a part of that process. I'm so proud of them.

I also get great joy when, during class, I see the light bulb turn on and a smile comes to their faces when they learn a concept we were studying.

We are so incredibly grateful to work with such devoted, giving volunteers like John. †
